## GAC RUNNERS

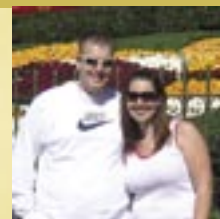

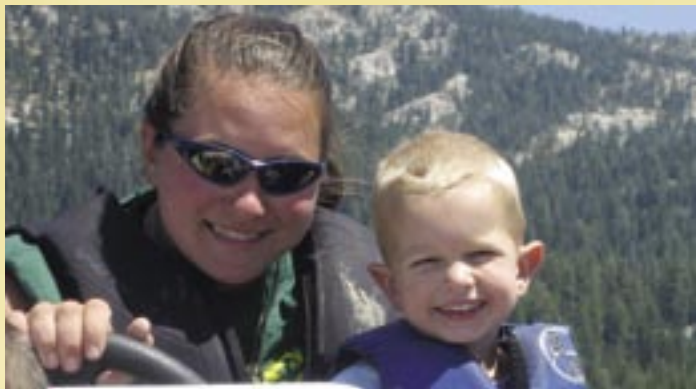


## STAFF PROFILE

## NEW CANYONEERING SPECIALTY CAMP

Gold Arrow Camp presents a new one-week program for campers looking for big adventure – Canyoneering Specialty Camp. Canyoneering is an outdoor recreational activity quickly increasing in popularity. It incorporates the skills of rappelling and rock climbing in a steep canyon setting. Campers learn how to set routes and negotiate waterfalls, boulders, and other obstacles.

Participants in the program will learn advanced rock climbing technique, anchor building, rappelling, gear review, first aid basics and risk and safety management. A final canyon adventure near Shaver Lake will apply the skills learned during the week to advanced ropes systems used for rappelling and zip lining. Team building and leadership skills will also be a focus of the program as campers work together to overcome each day's challenges.

The program is open to returning GAC campers, ages 12-17, and will take place August 19-25, 2006, during Specialty Week.
